427,828 Youth

Since our inception in 1991, ProAction Cops & Kids has provided funding to support police-led programming positively impacting the lives of 427,828 youth. We continue to support our police partners year after year to ensure more youth are given opportunities and access to activities they cannot afford.



5 Chapters

ProAction Cops & Kids operates in five chapters across Ontario. The charity began in Toronto (1991) then later expanded into Durham Region (2007), Hamilton (2008), Halton Region (2017) and Peel Region (2021). ProAction continues to expand its reach in Ontario and looks forward to welcoming new chapters and new communities in the future.



\$9.1M in Program Funding

Since 1991, we have distributed over 9.1 million dollars in funds to support our police-led programming. The demand for program support is once again increasing amongst our current police partners, as well as with other Ontario police services who are interested in becoming involved in our work.



2,391 Programs

We are proud to partner with many police services and provide funding for officers to lead police-initiated programs for vulnerable youth living in under-resourced communities. To date, we have supported 2,391 programs across all ProAction chapters thanks to the leadership of over 20,000 police officers.



Message from the President

Following two very challenging years for most charities, including ProAction, 2022 unfolded in a much more positive fashion – especially over the last six months of the year.

The need for our type of police-led programming remains both high and important. Our programs build skills, relationships and trust. They change attitudes. We were pleased to see the number of programs build towards historical levels across all five of our chapters. The range of programs continued to be diverse with new program ideas being evolved across our network.

One of our strategic priorities was the building of a successful chapter in Peel Region, which was launched in 2021. Through the commitment of Peel Regional Police, our Peel Council and the local community, we are off to a great start. A series of unique officer-led programs have evolved in Peel over the last two years and an impressive series of fundraising activities were undertaken in 2022. We were especially appreciative of the fact that ProAction's Peel Chapter was the primary beneficiary of the Inaugural Peel Regional Police Chief's Gala in November 2022.

In support of our growing range of programming we continue to lean on our friends and supporters to drive fundraising activity. This included our tried-and-true golf tournaments at $the\,Miss is saugua\,Golf\,\&\,Country\,Club, the\,ISN\,Golf\,Tournament$ at the Royal Ashburn Golf Club, and newer activities such as those undertaken in Peel. Our Holiday Giving Campaign and Auction achieved its aggressive targets once again in 2022.

Certainly, the highlight of our fundraising efforts was the development of Monopoly: Toronto Edition. We are so proud of the final product as we secured the support of many of Toronto and the GTA's most iconic landmarks, destinations and venues, supporting a total of 11 GTA charitable organizations with the sale of each board.

Our launch at Toronto Police Headquarters was covered by all major broadcasters, which served to raise our profile in the community. Monopoly: Toronto Edition and ProAction were very high profile for days! We have sold thousands of games and will continue to sell them until our inventory is sold out. The game remains a great gift idea! I can't thank the small team who took on this project enough. It was a massive undertaking – especially for a small charity. I also want to thank those organizations who bought space on the Board in celebration of our great city.

As we move into 2023, we remain confident that our programming efforts can make a difference in the lives of both youth and officers and the communities in which we partner. We will touch even more lives across our chapters this year and thank officers in our communities for their time and effort in developing and running these impactful programs.

I also want to thank our many supporters who have stood by us during some challenging times over the last three years and have been integral to our success.

To our staff, Chapter Council and Board members, police organizations and officers, Rod Black and Human Contact, thank you for the time and dedication you invest into ProAction in support of our many youth participants. Each of you understands that our mission to bring cops and kids together through our programs has successfully been creating trust, respect and safer communities since 1991, and continues to create life-changing opportunities for youth across all of our chapters.

The campaign highlighted programs from all five ProAction Chapters, and featured an amazing online auction, with a total fundraising goal of \$60,000.



Jack Sinclair Award Winner

The Jack Sinclair award recognizes the police officer with the most innovative police-youth program in Toronto.

PC Alexandru Benyi from Toronto Police Service 12 Division is a certified tennis instructor that has worked with Team Canada and Team Ontario.

The Weston Tennis Stars program began in the rear of community housing buildings using run down and poorly maintained tennis courts but thanks to PC Benyi's encouragement, the community members and fellow officers worked to clean up the courts, making them safe and useable

This program has had a major impact on police-youth relationships in 12 Division as PC Benyi has welcomed fellow Neighbourhood Community Officers and primary response officers to regularly participate and assist in the program.

PC Benyi's professional background and knowledge of the sport accompanied by his dedication to the youth in his community makes him extremely deserving of the Jack Sinclair Award.





PC Dale Swift, 33 Division
Jim Sneep Award Winner

The Jim Sneep award recognizes the police officer who has shown the most remarkable level of commitment to police-youth programs in Toronto.

PC Dale Swift began developing the Riddim and Blues dance program in July 2021 after recognizing the need for alternative, physical activity programs for local youth that were not sports-related. In this case, PC Swift used dance as a tool of self-expression for participants helping them to bridge gaps and develop relationships while focusing on mental health education and awareness.

The "Riddim and Blues" program allowed for youth who are typically withdrawn, socially, to gain a voice and the self-confidence to be who they are, and have the interests and opinions they have, without fear of judgement or ridicule.

PC Swift is always looking for ways to strengthen relationships between police and the communities they serve and is always willing to share and inspire other officers to do the same. The dedication, caring and support he shows to the communities and people he serves deserves the utmost recognition.





Alexia actively participated in the Westhill Cops & Kids Baseball program during its six-week run.

Throughout the program, she took on several roles and was most memorable for her abilities to play short stop, outfield and third base.

Alexia demonstrated fantastic abilities in hitting, catching, throwing, fielding and base running. Through officer instruction, she was able to demonstrate preparedness, concentration and focus. During scrimmage, Alexia demonstrated competitiveness and self-confidence. Her ability to think on her feet demonstrated her adaptiveness.

During the program, Alexia developed valuable skills such as risk-taking, strategizing, patience, perseverance and social skills. She gained self-confidence and became a leader within the program learning the importance of teamwork and communication.

Since M.Y. Camp ended, Chloe has had less anxiety about going to school, she is making new friends, trying out for sports teams, has joined some clubs, tried out for a speaking role in a school play and she even spoke in front of the whole school at a recent assembly.

We're so excited to recognize Chloe for all her accomplishments.




Prior to becoming a police officer, Cst. Les Smith was a licensed mechanic. His knowledge and expertise were essential during the beginning stages of the PRP Junior Mechanics program, where he was instrumental in developing lesson plans, creating PowerPoint presentations, and coordinating with management at the Peel Regional Police garage.

Importantly, Cst. Smith was able to create a safe environment where participants could easily learn. His attitude, teaching ability and approachableness were key reasons why the PRP Junior Mechanics program was so successful.

Cst. Smith leveraged his networks and relationships to bring in other mechanically inclined officers to assist with this program and he has been credited with the strong success of the PRP Junior Mechanics program, ensuring a strong cohesion between the program officers, participants, and staff.

D/Cst. Rodziewicz, lead officer of the program, looks forward to working with and leaning on Cst. Smith when developing another successful session in 2023.



D/Cst. Tom Rodziewicz developed and ran the PRP Junior Mechanics program with the intention of providing youth in Peel Region with an opportunity to learn about automotive mechanics through rebuilding and restoring a car.

The mechanics program itself was unique, but D/Cst. Rodziewicz pushed beyond the initial idea entering the vehicle into a demolition derby, driven by Deputy Chief Mark Andrews, which was both visionary and exceptional — especially considering DC Andrews finished in second place! The boost to morale for all involved was very positive.

The PRP Junior Mechanics program is a strong example of an innovative program. D/Cst. Rodziewicz made it a point to look beyond the typical sports type of programs and think outside the box to offer a program that allows the youth to develop a skill that can be carried forward into their future lives and potential job opportunities. His effort and genuine interest in the program are what made the difference.



Breanna successfully participated in the Peel Culinary program throughout 2022 where she was tasked with measuring and prepping ingredients for dishes the participants were collaborating on, chopping vegetables, herbs and fruit, and prepping various meats. She was extremely motivated and eager to learn, attending each culinary lesson with open mindedness and positivity. Breanna evolved to be a true leader who would never hesitate to help fellow classmates who required assistance.

As Breanna's knowledge grew, she started making suggestions on how a dish could be adapted based on the availability or affordability of ingredients. Breanna approached the handson culinary lessons with maturity; it was clear that Breanna took an interest in the culinary arts.

Breanna's personal growth and improved self-confidence, along with her passion and newly acquired knowledge in the Peel Culinary program makes her extremely deserving of the 2022 Peel Youth Award.

In the early sessions of the Bonnie's HorsePower program, Samiyah spoke very quietly, almost near a whisper. When the participants took part in program activities, Samiyah was always willing to provide the requested input; however, she projected the answer at a very low volume as she did not feel comfortable speaking in front of the group.

To ensure Samiyah felt comfortable participating with her peers, the program officer standing closest to her would relay her answers repeating them out loud for everyone to hear. Samiyah came to learn that her voice deserved to be heard and her input was valuable no matter how it was put forward.

Samiyah had never provided an answer without first being prompted until the Babysitter's Course certification held in the final weeks of the program. When tested on their first-aid training, Samiyah answered louder than ever before and followed up with seven more answers. The officers worked with the participants on confidence and voice projection, reinforcing the knowledge that they all deserved to be heard. Seeing this tremendous growth in Samiyah was beautiful and rewarding.

Samiyah has truly grown and stepped outside of her comfort zone while participating in the program and we look forward to seeing her confidence grow.

Youth Leadership Award

The Youth Leadership Award recognizes the youth who has demonstrated the highest level of leadership potential from a police-youth program across all ProAction Chapters in 2022.

Markia was a participant in both the 2022 Bonnie's HorsePower spring program and fall leadership program where she proved to be patient, dependable and adaptable while exhibiting a natural enthusiasm and confidence that made others feel welcome and at ease. Markia is also authentically and unapologetically herself and is not afraid to stand alone in her opinion.

Within her school community, Markia is a student ambassador with the Peel Black Family Engagement Committee and is involved with Agents 4 Social Change, an Afrocentric summer


